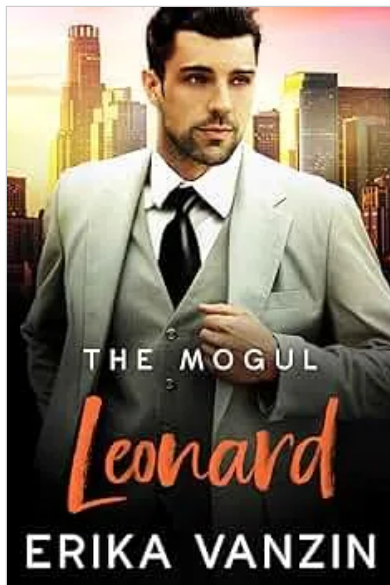




The Mogul: Leonard (Los Angeles Billionaires #4)
